**Musings on Ki Tetze --** *Ki Tetze* is a diverse collection of social, ethical, legal, and ritual laws. Through these *mitzvot* it is possible to cultivate the qualities of clarity, stability, wholeness, kindness, compassion, generosity, honesty, and justice. The blessing comes through us when we integrate those qualities and begin expressing them through our every word, thought and interaction. But first we must receive the deeper meaning and power of a mitzvah, take it personally and learn to apply its principles to our real, everyday lives.

The Torah is not interested in teaching you to feel compassion, but rather how to live compassionately. Feelings are situational, subjective, personal, and contingent upon individual whims and judgments. Moreover, we don't need divine revelation to instruct us to feel what we are naturally inclined to feel. What we do need divine revelation to teach us is how to draw upon our feelings and apply them beyond our subjective selves toward a higher calling, in response to a higher will. That is the mixed message of our Torah. Can you act with severity when necessary without losing your compassion? Can you flog someone who has been sentenced to be flogged, without losing sight of his dignity? (Devarim 25:3). Can you execute a murderer and act compassionately toward his corpse (Devarim 21:23)? Can you stigmatize compassionately? The ancient rabbis modeled this when they taught that the order of calling people up to the Torah during worship, is: "Ko'hain, Levite, Israelite. But if the choice is an ignorant Ko'hain or a learned *mamzer*, the learned *mamzer* takes precedence!" (Talmud Bavli, Ho'ra'yot 13a). Can you hold both, the disqualification and the virtue? Can you act with severity while maintaining your compassion? And vice-versa? Can you love your child and say No? As the 2nd-century Rabbi El'azar warned: "One who acts compassionately in a situation requiring severity will in the end act with severity in a situation deserving of compassion" (Midrash Tanchuma, Metso'ra, Ch. 1).

## Musings on The Shofar --

**A story.** It takes place during the time of the Inquisition, and it's called The Shofar of Don Fernando Aguilar. Each year at the Jewish New Year, many *Conversos* (Spanish Jews who officially converted to Christianity but many of whom secretly held on to Jewish practices) yearned to hear the sound of the *Shofar*. Throughout the centuries, the Shofar had come to be the quintessential symbol of Judaism and the Jewish people, so this yearning was not surprising. Such was the case for Don Fernando Aguilar, a conductor of the Royal Orchestra in Barcelona. But how could one sound the Shofar without provoking the ire of the Inquisition? Don Fernando devised a risky plan: Before *Rosh HaShanah*, he announced a public concert that would present the instrumental music of diverse cultures, to be held on a certain day (*Rosh HaShanah* happened to fall on that day). The concert featured various compositions, among them the Shofar was "played", complete with *teki'ah*, *shvarim-teru'ah*, *teru'ah*, and *teki'ah gdolah*. The clergy and the inquisition authorities, who were sitting in the audience, didn't suspect a thing. But many conversos got to hear the Shofar thanks to Don Fernando's subterfuge.
